The following is from the memory of their daughter, Virginia.

James Patrick Dorcy was the first son born to John Carroll Dorcy and Bridget Corr Dorcy at McHenry, Mississippi on Dec. 28, 1893.

As a very young man he moved west with his family who eventually ended up in the Sedro Wooley, WA. area. He became a logger and head rigger at Simpson Camp #2 near Shelton, WA. When World War I broke he entered the army at Camp Lewis and served till honorably discharged Sept 26, 1919 at Camp Dodge, Iowa.

He met Ruth Almina Mason and they were married in Shelton Dec 22, 1919. Jim and Ruth made their home in Shelton. They had two daughters, Anna Dorothea, Sept. 4, 1920 and Virginia Ruth, Nov. 11, 1921. Ruth died at age 28 in Shelton.



Later Jim became a person with many skills. His small business of reclaiming the abundance of downed logs left by logging was

becoming too successful and he was always sure in his own mind that he was purposely burned out for that reason.

He ran a service station for several years, did a stint in the Civilian Conservation Corp, cruised timber because he knew the woods so well, served several years as state fire warden, and became invaluable to older people especially as a house repairman -i.e. steps, leveling, leaks, etc. He seemed to be able to fix or hay-wire most anything into working order for a pittance. The day he suffered a stroke and died, he was putting a foundation under a house on Capitol Hill in Shelton.

He loved to dance and was much in demand by the widows of the community.

He resumed his allegiance to the Catholic Church and left a sizable piece of property to the Church when he died Oct. 19, 1957 at age 63 years.

Ruth Mason was born in 1898 in Rawlake, Michigan, the daughter of Charles and Martha L. Mason who farmed in the Olympia and Shelton areas. She died in 1926 at age 28 in Shelton where Jim and she made their home. Jim and Ruth had two children:

- (4) Anna Dorothea Dorcy was born in 1920 in Shelton. She was unmarried and died in 1945 in Shelton.
- (4) Virginia Ruth Dorcy was born in 1921 in Shelton and is a lifelong resident. She graduated from Shelton High School in 1940 and that same year married Marvin James Leman in Shelton. Virginia is a homemaker who excels in sewing and in 1960 she had to oversee the construction of their new home while Marvin was on

assignment in the Philippines. Marvin was born in 1918 in Fairborn, So Dakota to Mary Louvina Stuck and Edwin Lionel Leman. He was schooled in Shelton and served in WWII mainly on US Submarine Bases as Electricians Mate and was discharged at Bremerton, Washington. Later Marvin was an engineer for Simpson Timber Company. He had a vast knowledge of power generation and was highly regarded as a specialist on boilers and methods of eliminating emissions from bark burners, plywood dryers and wood waste fueled power generators. He held two patents in the area of pollution abatement and power generation. Simpson Timber Co. sent him on inspections to Chili, and to the Philippines for the year of 1960 where he oversaw the re-construction of a power plant which was dismantled in Coos Bay, Oregon and re-assembled on the Island of Mindanao, P. I. He was a dedicated Christian layman with a very real concern for the missionary work and people of the Philippines. Marvin died while on a business trip in Heber City, Utah in September, 1975. Virginia married Joe Fadden in 1977 and moved to a waterfront home at Agate near Shelton. She learned to enjoy fishing, hunting, camping and all outdoor pursuits. She and Joe traveled extensively in their RV from Canada to Mexico. When Joe died in 1992 Virginia sold their home and moved to a retirement park for seniors called Christmas Village in She loves traveling and her highlight trip was a Shelton. Mediterranean cruise with all of her children and grand-children in the summer of 1995. Her favorite past times are playing pinochle, going to the theater and dining out. Virginia and Marvin had two children:

- (5) Linda Fay Leman was born in 1943 in Shelton. She married Douglas Allen Hay in Shelton in 1965 when they both graduated from Oregon State University, she in Elementary Education and he in Agricultural Engineering. He is the son of Everett and Grace (Leek) Hay and was born in 1942 in Huron, SD. Linda and Doug went to LaPorte, Indiana where they worked in their respective fields and also worked as youth sponsors in their church. Since 1967 when they returned to the Northwest they have lived in Portland and Albany, Oregon and presently live near Tacoma. Linda next focused on the family for seventeen years, during which time they had two foster children and seven international students living in their home. Linda earned a masters degree from Lesley College in Computer Education when she was forty eight, and currently teaches for the University Place School District.
