Goals:

- The student will learn a primary care approach to the diagnosis and management of common medical problems presenting in a family practice setting.
- The student will increase his/her understanding of the role of the primary care physician.
- The student will learn elements of a patient-centered communication (PCC) approach to working with patients presenting in a family practice setting.

Objectives: (Each site may emphasize different objectives):

- The student will learn the diagnosis and management of a defined set of common problems cared for by family physicians.
- The student will be exposed to the full scope of family practice as represented in the WWAMI region including obstetric patients and other patients from all age groups.
- The student will experience working in a variety of practice settings.
- The student will understand the concept of continuity of care.
- The student will learn to view the patient within the context of relevant biological, social, familial, environmental, psychological, cultural and genetic factors in health or illness.
- The student will learn the principles and practice of disease prevention and health maintenance.
- The student will learn how a family physician works with other professionals in facilitating and coordinating patient care.
- The student will learn the family physician's role in facilitating cost-effective medical care.
- The student will understand the importance of practice management in the primary care setting.
- The student will learn about the lifestyles and community roles of the family physician.
- The student will understand the principles and practice three fundamental steps of PCC: establishing focus (EF), soliciting the patient's perspective of the illness (PPI) and reaching common ground (RCG) during patient encounters.

ALASKA

FAMED 653:	Anchorage
Location:	Anchorage, AK
Facility:	Alaska Native Medical Center
Enrollment:	6, AWSpS
Site Coordinator:	Laurie Olnes, MD
Housing:	The MAC 505 apartment is located half of a mile from the Primary Care Center, across the street from North Hall. It is a 4-bedroom apartment that is located on the 3 rd floor. The apartment has four bedrooms labeled A, B, C, and D. The apartment has one bathroom, kitchen, and storage area. The kitchen has all of the necessary cooking ware, full-size refrigerator, oven, stove and small appliances (coffee pot, microwave). Students pay for their own food and use the kitchen for preparing meals.
Transportation:	A 2002 Honda Civic with automatic transmission is available to student on site.

The clerkship is based at the Alaska Native Medical Center. The Hospital and "old" PCC were completed in 1997, with the new PCC addition completed in 2002, and is a beautiful state-of-the-art facility. The main hospital is supported by the adjacent two-story Anchorage Primary Care Center that houses the Department of Family Medicine along with the outpatient offices for OB/GYN, Pediatrics, and Health Education. The Family Medicine office is a large outpatient group practice where you will spend your rotation. Twenty-seven physicians, 7 mid-levels, and an additional 50 support personnel staff the practice. A full range of outpatient family medicine is practiced, with an emphasis on adult medical problems. Pediatrics makes up approximately 10% of the patients, and at present only five of the staff physicians are actively practicing obstetrics, so OB is very limited. Some complimentary medicine is also being practiced at the site with two of the staff physicians also serving as credentialed acupuncturists. The family medicine department is in the process of integrating complementary medicine (physical therapy, acupuncture, massage therapy, and chiropractic care) more closely with traditional outpatient family medicine. Our site is also on the forefront of "advanced access" a new concept in health care delivery. The emphasis is on both continuity of care and urgent care access for empaneled patients to their designated provider. There is no call responsibility for students at this site, but clinic time can run into the evening. Physicians will also on occasion, be traveling to village sites in remote Alaska. Where there is the opportunity, the student will be included on these trips.

FAMED 663:	Petersburg
Location:	Wrangell/Petersburg, AK
Facility:	TideLine Family Clinic/Petersburg Medical Clinic
Enrollment:	4, AWSpS
Site Coordinators:	Dave McCandless, MD and John Bergren, MD
Housing:	An apartment will be provided near town with general furnishings, including towels, bedding, dishes and internet access and local telephone service is provided. Please arrange your own long distance service.
Transportation:	A car will be provided. It should be clean and full of gas when you arrive. Please make sure you leave it in the same condition.
NOTE:	Site placement is subject to change between the two islands. Dr. McCandless should be contacted for more information.

Wrangell and Petersburg are small island communities separated by about 40 miles of forest and ocean in central southeast Alaska. These are popular cruise ship and tourist destinations along the Inside Passage. Both towns can be reached by Alaska Airlines and the Alaska Marine Highway ferries. The main industries are fishing, fish processing, timber, and tourism. The downtown areas are adjacent to the docks and the medical facilities are within walking distance. You can expect to serve a diverse population, which includes Native American, Scandinavian and a variety of other ethnic groups that make up these unique communities. Indoor and outdoor recreation opportunities abound so bring equipment and clothing to match the season. Expect rain!

Twenty-eight residents, 14 faculty members, and a psychologist, as well as a variety of support personnel staff the Family Medicine Residency of Idaho (FMRI). The student spends the majority of time in the clinic and is included in as many in-office procedures as possible. Students help admit and care for a limited number of hospital patients. Obstetrics experience is available at this site, as well as the opportunity to visit other health care facilities (nursing home, WIC and CPS) in Boise. Students are expected to participate in several educational meetings. Given adequate advance notice, a one-week rural experience can be arranged. There are many excellent recreational opportunities in the Boise area including skiing, fishing, kayaking, bicycling, golf, and tennis.

FAMED 657:	Pocatello Clinic
Location:	Pocatello, ID
Facility:	Family Practice Group, Pocatello Clinic
Enrollment:	9, AWSpS

Housing:	Two-bedroom/ two-bathroom townhouse with a garage/patio and all the amenities. No pets.
Transportation:	Car required.

Students regularly work with two family physicians in the practice and may spend one morning a week with local consultants in internal medicine and orthopedics. This practice demonstrates the major contribution that a group of family physicians can make to health care in a moderate-sized town and adjacent rural areas, which lacks physicians. Students are on call once a week and, in addition, may work one evening clinic per week. The Pocatello medical community has an active series of didactic sessions. Students usually spend one week in Montpelier, Idaho: a community of 3,000 people located 80 miles south of Pocatello, working in a solo private practice. Intermountain Medical Clinic is a multi-specialty partnership practice. All students will be assigned to work at least five weeks in this busy practice. In it you will see the full range of patients and problems and participate in its active inpatient practice. Family practitioners in the group have developed special practice emphasis including diabetes, female medicine and obstetrics. There is one hospital with two campuses in Pocatello to which faculty admit patients: Portneuf Medical Center. Pocatello is a small, but growing location, with a population of 60,000. The major economic base of the community is light manufacturing, industry, and agriculture.

Eighteen residents, 12 faculty members, and a variety of support personnel staff the Montana Family Medicine Residency (MFMR). The student spends two weeks in the outpatient clinic, two weeks in hospital service, and two weeks with another Family Medicine clinic affiliated with one of the local hospitals. Students help admit and care for a limited number of hospital patients. Students are expected to participate in several educational meetings during the noon conference at the residency. There are many excellent recreational opportunities in the Billings area including skiing, fishing, kayaking, bicycling,

golf, and tennis; for more information go to the Billings Track website at www.billingstrack.org.

Facility:	Northern Montana Medical Group East

Transportation:	Students fly or use train to get to Havre. A four-wheel drive vehicle is provided for students on site.

The Havre area has a population of approximately 12,000 and is located on the "Hi-Line" in north central Montana. It's a community that features numerous outdoor activities including a ski area, fishing, and hiking. It is also the home of Montana State University-Northern. The site offers both diverse cultural and clinical experiences including operative obstetrics. The Northern Montana Medical Group East utilizes Northern Montana Hospital, a 49-bed acute care facility, featuring an ICU/CCU and obstetrical unit, ambulatory surgery wing, and an inpatient psychiatric unit adjacent to the hospital.

The Family Practice Clerkship student in Missoula has a unique opportunity to participate with family practice doctors in a wide range of settings. From multispecialty clinic practice (Western Montana Clinic) to community health center (Partnership Health Center), hospital based single specialty practice (Community Medical Center) and HMO (Curry Health Center). Family Practice physicians in each location have different styles – some focused on OB and family care (Community Medical Center), others on a more defined patient population, like the homeless or the University community.

The family practice department is envisioning a diverse rotation with a combination of inpatient and outpatient experience with family practice physicians which may include obstetrics & newborn care when possible. We would also like to expose students to the various roles filled in the community by family practitioners, including student health services at the University of Montana and urgent care, possibly also health and drug/alcohol rehabilitation and nursing home care. Students on FM rotation in Missoula will spend 3-4 weeks at Mountain View FP, Parkside FP, or Western MT Clinic and then 2 weeks at either Curry Health or PHC to offer exposure to a wide variety of practice, styles, and type.

FAMED 656:	Whitefish
Location:	Whitefish, MT
Facility:	Glacier Medical Association

Housing:	Three-bedroom house that is ½ mile from the clinic and four blocks from the hospital. The house has a garage, washer and dryer, dishwasher, cable (with a small old TV), yard, and new appliances. It's within walking distance of a grocery store. No pets.
Transportation:	A car is required in fall and winter. A car is recommended in spring and summer.

The student works with a ten-physician family practice-internal medicine group in western Montana that covers a wide range of family medicine including pediatrics, internal medicine, surgery, and obstetrics with both in- and out-patient settings. A "free-clinic for the working poor" experience is also available. The physicians provide emergency room coverage, and students receive an in-depth exposure to this aspect of their practice. Some physicians in this group do their own c-sections. This community is

approximately 20 miles west of Glacier National Park, 7 miles south of the Big Mountain ski area, and near other major mountain wilderness areas. Tourism, timber, farming, aluminum smelting, and railroading are the major industries in the area. This unit has been involved with teaching students since 1974.

WASHINGTON

Housing:	A house overlooking Padilla Bay and Mt. Baker with three bedrooms, living room, family room, two-car garage, and a nice little deck and yard. It has separate upper and lower entrances with separate bathrooms. It's about one-mile from the hospital. No pets and/or smoking. Children and spouses could easily fit, but would need to be coordinated with the other student for the rotation.
Transportation:	The house is within walking or biking distance, about 1 mile. For students at North Cascade Family Practice. A car is needed as Mt. Vernon is about 20 minutes from Anacortes.

The Anacortes clerkship takes place in three practices located in the Puget Sound community. The primary teaching site, Fidalgo Medical Associates, is a multi-specialty group practice of 11 physicians, one physician assistant and one family nurse practitioner. It is led by Dr. Laursen. Students may also be placed at Island Family Physicians in Anacortes or North Cascade Family Physicians in nearby Mt. Vernon. Students spend the majority of time in ambulatory care clinics, but also are actively involved in the care of hospitalized patients, including surgical assisting and obstetrics. Students rotate on emergency call at the hospital. Students spend time at the Swinomish Indian reservation to experience some of the cultural diversity seen in medicine. Anacortes is a medium-sized rural community and gives students an opportunity to see medicine practiced in various group settings.

FAMED 661:	Bremerton Residency

Housing:	Fully furnished apartment in short-term corporate housing about 15 minutes from Naval Hospital.
Transportation:	A car is necessary for transportation
Additional Information:	There is a full service gym available to students, both at the housing site and at the Naval Hospital complex.

Puget Sound Family Medicine Residency at Bremerton Naval Hospital utilizes a 60-bed hospital and has eight faculty physicians and eighteen residents. The family medicine clinic serves 5,000 patients per month. Services provided include adult, pediatric and geriatric medicine, prenatal care and the full gamut of family medicine procedures. Inpatient medicine, pediatrics, and obstetrical experiences are plentiful. A new 60,000 square foot state-of-the-art Family Care Center is connected to the Naval Hospital. At least 80 percent of a student's time will be spent seeing patients in physicians' offices. Students take call one night per week. You are welcome and encouraged to participate in medical procedures and obstetrical deliveries. You will have the opportunity to rotate through at least four procedural clinics. One half day will be spent with a visiting nurse making house calls.

FAMED 659:	Country Doctor Community Clinic
Location:	Seattle (Capitol Hill)

The Country Doctor Community Clinic is one of 14 community health centers in King County. Located on Capitol Hill, this clinic has served low-income residents of the area since 1971. Five family practice physicians, 2 nurse practitioners, and 4 physician assistants provide approximately 24,000 patient encounters per year. There are also mental health counselors and a psychiatrist on staff. In addition

there is a support staff of medical assistants, nurses, pharmacists, lab techs and a community outreach staff. Students are on-call with one of the preceptors one night per week and one weekend, and participate in delivery and follow-up of obstetrical patients at Swedish Hospital First Hill and adult medical patients at Swedish Providence Hospital. The clinic provides the full spectrum of Family Medicine care for a multiethnic patient population including a large number of patients infected with HIV. In addition to seeing patients in the Clinic, the student will be involved in community outreach activities with the Patient Support Services team. A clinic-oriented "mini-project" is required.

FAMED 645:	Group Health Cooperative Residency
Location:	Seattle (Capitol Hill)

Clerkships at Group Health are coordinated by the Family Medicine Residency Program. Founded in 1969, the residency program at Group Health is a charter program involved in founding the American Board of Family Medicine. The residency reflects these origins, being centered in a non-profit health maintenance organization with a strong focus on Family Medicine providers offering a wide spectrum of care. Located in the Capitol Hill campus in Seattle, the program has 15 residents, 11 physician faculty, 2 behavioral science faculty, a pharmacist and nursing and administrative support staff. Clinic facilities include exam rooms, administrative offices, lab, minor surgery, medical library, and pharmacy. This clerkship site also gives students an opportunity to be exposed to state-of-the-art resources including an evidence-based-medicine database, nationally respected treatment guidelines developed from comprehensive, physician-led reviews of best-available research and EpicCare, our advanced electronic clinical information system which supports greater accessibility, coordination, and patient confidentiality system wide. Most of the rotation concentrates on outpatient experience where students will see a racially, culturally and socio-economically diverse group of patients of all ages. Students work with both third-year residents and faculty members. In addition to family medicine clinics, students work in several multidisciplinary clinics: the teen pregnancy and parenting clinic, a well-child clinic and an HIV clinic; one half day is spent visiting a nursing home. Students will spend one week rounding in the mornings on in-patients with the Family Medicine rounding team at Virginia Mason Medical Center. Family Medicine didactics are held Wednesday afternoons. At the end of the rotation, each student will give a brief presentation.

FAMED 642:	Madigan Residency

Facility:	Madigan Army Medical Center

Transportation:	Car required. Proof of auto insurance & vehicle registration is necessary.

The Family Practice Clinic at Madigan Army Medical Center at Fort Lewis is a few miles south of Tacoma. The clinic is located within the hospital and is staffed by 16 faculty, 18 residents, and nurses and medical assistants. Clinic facilities include exam rooms, administrative offices, lab, minor surgery rooms, colposcopy and flexible sigmoidoscopy suites, and a conference room. The majority of time will be spent in the ambulatory clinic. Night call consists of phone triage, emergency room evaluations and hospital admissions. There is a daily morning report followed by a 20-minute didactic session. Students present a topic of their interest during one of these time periods. During Family Practice Grand Rounds, scheduled Wednesday mornings, topics are covered in greater detail by a specialty department. One week will be spent on the Family Practice In-patient Team.

Transportation:	The clinic, hospital and apartment are within walking distance. A car is necessary for off-site activities.

The Location of Olympia, Washington (also the state capital and located in Thurston County) has been named by "Money Magazine" and "USA Today" as one of America's most livable cities. The population of Thurston County is 200,000 and growing. Compared to other urban centers, Thurston County is relatively free from big-location problems such as traffic congestion, pollution and crime. State government is the largest employer. Education, forest products, construction, retail trade, the Port of Olympia, and light manufacturing are other major job providers. Providence St. Peter Hospital, with more than 1,500 employees, is the area's largest non-governmental employer. Thurston County has numerous golf courses, bicycle trails, lakes, saltwater marinas, outdoor sports facilities, and off-road parks. The Pacific Ocean, Hood Canal, Olympic Peninsula, Mt. Rainier, and Mt. St. Helen are within easy driving distance and provide pleasant day trips or weekend getaways. Providence St. Peter Hospital Family Medicine Residency Program is an 18 resident program with 6 family physician faculty, a pediatrician, an obstetrician, 3 nurse practitioners, a dietician, and a social worker. Dr. VandeKieft is assisted by Fawn Ross, Education Manager. The clerkship emphasizes skills for rural care, care of the underserved, chronic disease management, and obstetrics. In addition to seeing patients in the office, students are encouraged to take one night of call per week. In the office the student is involved in our Adolescent Obstetrics Clinic, Medicine Consult Clinic (HIV intake), hospice care, and the Diabetes Group Visit. In the hospital, the student is involved in medicine and family practice admissions, ER visits and obstetrical care. Students have an opportunity to do nursing home visits, home visits and hospice team meetings and spend a day at a rural site. Seminars and didactics are available almost daily.

Facility:	Wenatchee Valley Medical Center, Omak Clinic

Activities:	Skiing, golf, hiking and athletic club in town.

The clerkship is operated in a five-physician private practice that is affiliated with the Wenatchee Valley Clinic (WVC), a specialty center located 90 miles away in Wenatchee. The practice provides a new, cooperative model of health care delivery: family practitioners provide the primary care for the community and the WVC provides specialist referral and consultation services and CME on a regular basis in Omak. Omak is a small community of 5,000. The principle economic base of the area is lumber, tourism, and agriculture. Hospital care is provided in Midvalley Hospital, a 37 bed, level 2 facility. Services include full OB, coronary care, intensive care and nuclear medicine.

The Sea Mar Community Health Center is a large and successful community health center dedicated to the care of the medically underserved Latino population of Seattle. Sea Mar is part of a multi-service agency that provides comprehensive ambulatory medical care, radiology services, laboratory services, health education, social work, nutrition counseling, mental health counseling, gynecology, prenatal and obstetric services, pediatrics, adult medicine, home health nurses and dental services. Sea Mar has over 32,000 active records and has over 107,000 patient encounters per year. The patient population is similar to that at Providence with a predominance of uninsured and Medicaid patients. A large percentage of Hispanic (85%), Southeast Asian and other minorities utilize the community health center. Sea Mar operates four additional migrant health centers in the Puget Sound area - in Mt. Vernon, Marysville, Bellingham and Lynden - which serve a large migrant and seasonal farm worker population as well as one additional urban community health center in Tacoma. Students also acquire some geriatrics experience at the SeaMar Nursing Home. Residents who are interested also have the opportunity to do some work in those clinics.

Family Medicine Spokane is located in the downtown area of Spokane, just west of Browne Avenue, on 5th Avenue. This family practice program includes 21 traditional residents, 6 rural training residents, 6 MD faculty, and 4 non-MD faculty (2 physician assistants, 1 behavioral scientist and a pharmacologist). The clinic staff consists of 4 RNs and 4 medical assistants. Facilities within the clinic include an outpatient laboratory, geriatric assessment room, counseling room, three outpatient procedure rooms, one minor surgery room and a stress treadmill room. There is also a large conference room on the second floor with a teaching conference 4 days/week.

FAMED 652:	Spokane Valley

The Spokane Valley practice is staffed by five physicians and two family practice certified physician assistants. The student will work with three MDs and one of the Physician Assistants (PA). The student has an opportunity to see the effectiveness and quality with which family medicine can be practiced in both rural and urban settings. Each physician has a full-time practice in Spokane and a part-time practice in nearby rural, Fairfield, Washington. The physicians in this group have a broad spectrum of hospital privileges, surgical and obstetrical skills are an important component of their practices. This site also offers an emergency department experience and participates in new HMO insurance plans. A brief orientation to Family Medicine Spokane is offered.

FAMED 646:	Swedish Residency
Facility:	Swedish Family Medicine First Hill Campus
Location:	Seattle, WA
Enrollment:	8, AWSpS

Thirty residents, 8 family physician faculty, 1 pediatrician, 2 psychologists, and support personnel staff the Swedish Family Practice residency program. Other clinic faculty include a psychiatrist, consultant cardiologists, orthopedists, and ob/gyn. The student may take one weekend of call with the on-call faculty and resident, which lasts from Friday evening until Monday morning. Many seminars and didactics are offered during the clerkship. The student will do nursing home visits, visit an alcohol treatment center, spend time in pain clinic, physical therapy clinic, and work in our lab. One day will be spent on home visits for high-risk obstetrical patients. Students will work at the Downtown Family Medicine Clinic, a satellite residency training site run jointly with the Public Health Department - Seattle-King County. The clinic serves the inner location underserved; women, children, homeless, minority, and refugee patients are aided by the clinic. The 45th Street Clinic is also affiliated with Swedish Family Medicine and may be available for this clerkship.

Swedish Family Medicine is staffed by 18 residents, 6 full-time and 2 part-time faculty as well as guest preceptors, a full-time pharmacist, a lab technologist, 5 social workers and guest faculty in obstetrics/gynecology, pediatrics, and psychiatry. Didactics occur every Tuesday afternoon. Medical morbidity and mortality sessions take place on Wednesday mornings. Students take call one night per week and one weekend during the rotation. Students spend two weeks providing care for pediatric, obstetric and internal medicine inpatients on the family medicine service. This site emphasizes care for a multicultural, inner Location: underserved population. The Swedish Family Medicine program also offers a rich opportunity for students who speak Spanish. Be certain to let the site coordinator know about your Spanish language skills once you are scheduled for the site, and well before your clerkship begins.

The University of Washington Family Medical Center (UWMC) site includes 18 residents and 14 faculty members divided into six teams, who staff the Family Medical Center. Supporting staff at this location include a clinical pharmacist, a mental health counselor, a liaison psychiatrist, a social worker, and a nutritionist. Students spend time at two sites: the University of Washington Family Practice Residency on Roosevelt and the University of Washington Physicians Neighborhood (UWPN) Woodinville Clinic. The on-call responsibility is with a third-year resident once a week. The student participates in emergency room and obstetrical coverage when on call. Attendance is expected at didactics and seminars every Wednesday afternoon in the Family Medicine clinic on Roosevelt. Students also participate in morning report inpatient rounds three times a week. Students learn communication and family assessment skills and make one educational presentation to the clinical team. You will spend two days per week at the UWPN Woodinville Clinic. It is staffed by seven family physicians. Additionally, a psychologist, nurse educator, and nutritionist work part time. Some specialists come to see patients in the clinic periodically. The UWPN Woodinville clinic uses EPIC exclusively, a state-of-the-art electronic records system, that will be necessary to learn prior to seeing patients at this site. Pamela Sheffield, who coordinates the rotation at the Woodinville clinic, will provide instruction. It is helpful to have access to a car. Travel time by car from the UWMC site to Woodinville varies with the time of day, but averages 30-45 minutes. Parking is available. If you choose to commute by bus, there is a Metro "park and ride" located next to the clinic and travel time from Seattle is usually less than an hour.

Twenty-four residents, 8 full-time faculty, 1 part-time faculty, a behavioral scientist, clinical pharmacists, and other support personnel staff this site. The Renton Valley Family Medicine residency program is located a few miles south from downtown Renton. In addition to seeing patients in the office, the student is scheduled to be on-call four evenings during the clerkship with an expectation to perform one formal evaluation per call night. Obstetrical experience is available by following a faculty or resident's obstetrical patient from prenatal care to delivery. Students may join the behavioral scientist in doing consultations with residents' patients, including smoking cessation. Seminars and didactics are required 3-4 days per week during the lunchtime hour. Students make site visits to a long-term care facility and spend one day with a hospice care team. Students also attend pediatric specialty clinics.

Eighteen residents and 9 family practice faculty with a full complement of other health professionals staff the residency. The Central Washington Family Medicine residency is located 2 1/2 hours east of Seattle. The mission of the residency is to serve the needs of underserved and rural populations. Yakima is located in a health manpower shortage area with a diverse population including significant Hispanic and American Indian populations. The student spends the majority of their time in the clinic, but is also involved in hospital care at two community hospitals. One week may be spent at the Toppenish Indian Health Services site. Call averages once per week and includes emergency room evaluations and admissions. Educational activities include community service organizations, site visits, hospital-based lectures, procedures in the clinic, and residency didactics. The eastern slopes of the Cascades are

minutes away with hiking, skiing and fishing. Multitudes of wineries are available for touring, and plenty of sunshine is available year round.

The Tacoma Family Medicine residency has 18 residents, 9 family physicians, 1 nurse practitioner, 1 physician assistant, 1 pharmacist and a behavioral scientist. This clerkship provides an extensive clinic experience in the residency and regular opportunity for nursing home rounds and occasional home visits. The residency serves the urban underserved of Pierce County and its mission is to train practitioners for service to the urban underserved and rural communities. There is at least one night per week of on-call responsibility with a minimum of 1 admission per night. The student presents reports on hospital admissions to faculty/residents in 3-5 minute reports on the morning after the call night, followed by a case-oriented discussion and rounds. Students attend weekly teaching conferences and spend 1 week on the hospital inpatient service.

The Family Medical Center is located in the hospital, which provides a unique opportunity to experience all aspects of family practice. The hospital has 27 acute care beds with ICU/CCU, obstetrical ward, surgery, and 24-hour emergency room. The hospital has fully equipped Lab and Radiology departments, including CT, US, and MRI. The hospital lab and x-ray are also used by the clinic. Buffalo has served as a Rural/Underserved Opportunity Program (RUOP) site.

Students will work with the site coordinator, Dr. Marion Smith and her practice group of eight Family Physicians and an Internal Medicine/Geriatric specialist. The group also includes a Physician Assistant

and a General Surgeon. The practice does the entire range of family and community care, including Emergency Department coverage, OB, pediatrics, in-patient, surgery, surgery assists and care center/nursing home practice. This cohesive group of physicians is employed by Banner Health, and has a collaborative relationship with the Community Hospital in Torrington, owned by Banner Health. The hospital is a 25 bed Critical Access Hospital with a 24 hour Emergency Department, Obstetrics, surgery, and a full array of ancillary departments. The Banner Health campus of Banner Medical Clinic, Community Hospital and Goshen Care Center are all conveniently located within about a 4 block radius. Peak Wellness, Public Health, two dental clinics, and an eye clinic are located in the same area. Torrington and Goshen County also provide the students the opportunity to work with Peak Wellness, mental health services, and St. Joseph's Children's Home and treatment center. This practice will provide an in depth look at family and community care in a rural setting. The physicians are actively involved and can provide exposure to EMT training, ambulance service, public health, bio-terrorism, state programs for special health needs, group visits, community education, and teaching. The physicians work with residency programs from the Cheyenne and Casper Family Practice Residency, and it is a Rural/Underserved Opportunity Program (RUOP) site for first year medical students.

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
